THE PROTON X50:



After spending much of 2020 at home to avoid the COVID-19 virus, many of us are ready to reconsider those travel plans we put aside last year. As restrictions are gradually lifted, Malaysian families can begin to venture out once more, at least in Malaysia, and what better way is there to experience all that our beautiful country has to offer than by hitting the road in a brand new X50 from Proton?

NB: The reviewer was provided with the X50 TGDi Flagship model, which had all of the top line features Proton has to offer.

Built for journeys with your family or a road trip with your best buds, the Proton X50 is fully-equipped to handle your 2021 adventures, with spacious seating, a luxurious inside and a sporty outside, as well as technology that is future ready. The car comes in four models, ranging from the 1.5T Standard to the 1.5 TGDi Flagship. After taking a test drive in the 1.5 TGDi Flagship model, we can safely say that this is a highly impressive product from Proton that comes with a relatively affordable price point of RM 103,300 (on-the-road without insurance).

Easy on the Eyes

When you approach the car, the first thing you truly notice is the dual tone exterior and the visible dual tone interior. The X50 comes in the following colours: Snow White — a pure eggshell; Armour Silver — a shiny metallic akin to steel; Jet Grey — a stormy almost-black; Ocean Blue — a distinguished and bright royal hue; Citric Orange — a standout tangerine; and Passion Red — a striking crimson. According to Proton, buyers so far have been drawn to the Jet Grey and Snow White variations, followed by Armour Silver and Passion Red; there have also been a handful of bold customers that opted for the Citric Orange and Ocean Blue shades.

The rear of the X50 is outfitted with impressive-looking Quad Exhaust Tailpipes, which give the car a racetrack-ready appearance. The boot of the car features an automatic button for closing and opening it (an optional accessory), making it convenient for you to load and unload your baggage.

Moving on into the interior of the car, the plush seats were outfitted in black and red smooth-to-the-touch leatherette, making for a comfortable seating experience. The driver and front passenger also have ready access to the floating floor console, which has multiple compartments, including space for your phone, Touch N' Go card, and the assorted coins and receipts people tend to accumulate on a daily drive. The console also has three USB ports, one in front and two in the rear, so you can charge all your devices on the go. Because it takes up virtually no space, both the passenger and driver of our drive had plenty of legroom. On the top, the X50 has a panoramic sunroof, which showcases the sky and comes with a shade that can be used to close off the top window with a press of a button or via voice command.



Safe for the Whole Family

Standing out in the crowd, the X50 isn't just an attractive car; it also offers peace of mind when you drive with its host of safety features. The result of years of research by Swedish safety authority Volvo and the innovative Chinese company Geely, there are 6 SRS airbags in this car, an electronic stability control function to prevent the car from spinning out of control, an N95 cabin filter for clean air, and a tyre pressure monitoring system, meaning that you'll never have to second-guess whether your tyres are travel-ready again. For navigating tight spots, drivers can rely on the 360 camera and the Auto Park Assist function, which parks the car for you in vertical and parallel spots.

What really blew us away about the safety characteristics of the X50 however, was the Advanced Driver Assistance System, that covers nearly all the aspects of a typical drive, including:

- Autonomous Emergency Braking
- Forward Collision Warning
- Adaptive Cruise Control with Stop & Go
- Intelligent Cruise Control

In addition, the Lane Keep Assist and Lane Departure Warning systems, both of which are heralded by a subtle beeping noise or tactile feedback with steering assist when the car is in motion, ensured that we kept inside the lines while testing out the X50's speed, power, and torque.



From Penang to Pekan, You're Connected Wherever You Go


A prominent feature of the X50's brushed aluminium dashboard is the 10.25" infotainment head unit. Just a fraction smaller than the latest tablets, this screen can be navigated by touch; it was really quite something to see weather updates, online navigation, and entertainment options all on one intuitive screen. As a bonus, both Android and iOS users can also mirror their phone onto the device. Also on the infotainment unit is the voice command function "Hi Proton", which can be used to play music, find out the weather, and even to close the sunshade!

When we stepped outside the car after the drive, we were also able to remotely control the X50 (lights and horn, windows, remote engine start, air-conditioning control and real-time vehicle conditions, among other things) via the PROTON Link App, which seemed very convenient if you have your hands full.



When starting up the X50 using the push start button, we could already feel the power thrumming via the steering wheel beneath our fingertips, even before truly hitting the accelerator. Pickup was efficient and smooth; the 1.5 turbocharged direct engine (TGDi) does the work for you and we were able to manoeuvre into busy weekend Klang Valley traffic with relative ease. The X50 has a 7-speed Dual Clutch Transmission with Manual Mode and runs a 2-wheel drive system (all-wheel or 4-wheel drive is not currently available). The Flagship model, which we tested, has a max power of 130 (177)/5500 kW(PS)/rpm and a max torque of 255/1500~4000 Nm/rpm. Thanks to the previously mentioned Lane Keep Assist and Lane Departure Warning systems, we were able to handle sharp curves in the road with no issue.

While the X50 is certainly sporty and modern enough to be the car for a first-time buyer, Proton reports that most current customers are actually families with one to two children, and that the car is often bought as a second option for a household. After our own review of the vehicle, we can definitely see the appeal of choosing the X50 over another family-oriented car that is not in the same price range and can't even be considered a direct competitor; the X50 simply takes features that are common in more expensive vehicles advanced driver assistant system, automatic sensors for a variety of driving situations, automatic parking assistance, and total connectivity — and offers them to buyers at a lower and pandemic-proof price. To top it all off, this car's stunning exterior and welcoming interior truly makes it the ideal choice for someone who is looking to take a well-deserved break from uncertain times by going for a drive.

There are very few countries globally that have not been spared the havoc caused by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Much has been made of in the media about how each nation is coping with the pandemic and what measures they will take in 2021 to keep the virus at bay. Here is a look at three countries with unique strategies and how Malaysia compares:



Australia

Not out of the woods just yet

Late last year, Australians were relieved to hear that there had been some days during the week where infection rates were down to 0, and measures implemented by their government have eased, although gathering, business, and transport restrictions are still in place. Nonessential businesses are allowed to operate, but the federal government still restricts public gatherings to one person per four square meters and two square meters in smaller spaces. To keep their citizens safe, Australia has a COVIDSafe app, similar to the MySejahtera app that we are all familiar with that helps track where people are and to stop the spread. As for foreigners hoping to enter Australia, a decision was recently made to continue travel restrictions until March 2021, which is also when Australia hopes to get the approved COVID-19 vaccine.



Moving forward after the failure of the herd immunity strategy

In the spring of 2020, news broke worldwide that Sweden was taking a drastically different approach to tackle the COVID-19 virus by not implementing lockdowns and instead banking on the herd immunity strategy, which assumes that once enough members of a population are immune to the disease, then there is less chance of the disease spreading. Instead of asking people to stay at home, the Swedish government encouraged people to keep social distancing of up to 1 meter, meet friends and family outside, and to use hand sanitiser whenever possible. By the fall however, Sweden had recorded much higher numbers of COVID deaths as compared to their Scandinavian neighbours, and a second outbreak threw the country's health sector into disarray. As a result, the government has had to retract previous instructions, while also restricting public gatherings to 8 people and banning restaurants and bars from selling alcohol after 10 pm. In terms of travel restrictions, anyone wishing to enter Sweden from countries outside the European Union were banned from doing so until December 22 of last year.

Singapore

A good example of how to handle the pandemic, but consequences abound


While many of the cases recorded in the city-state came from migrant workers, strict measures in public spaces and travel restrictions helped to curb the spread in late 2020. In October, no new cases were recorded in the dormitories hosting migrant workers, according to the government. However, Singapore now has to deal with the fact that its neighbours, including Malaysia, are still recording high numbers of cases daily, which in effect lessens the chance of establishing a "travel bubble" that will help to boost her economy, although it did manage to establish one such bubble with Hong Kong in November. In terms of economic recovery, experts are expecting business to be (almost) back to normal by end-2021 and is also expecting the approved vaccine to arrive on their shores by the first quarter of the year.



A long recovery road ahead

While it seemed that Malaysia had a temporary reprieve from the virus in late July and throughout September, a resurgence of infections in the later part of the year set us back. As the government struggles to ensure that the economy remains stable and has only imposed a Conditional Movement Control Order, Malaysians should remain vigilant and realise that the virus is here to stay for a long time. Those seeking financial aid for loans to be repaid can still reach out to their respective banks and the government's approval of EPF withdrawals (while controversial) should help to lift some financial burdens for the B40 population. In December, the drop in cases as well as the announcement of a UK-approved vaccine by Pfizer lifted economic doubts, but the return of complacency is a real fear for the current government, which is continuing to restrict public movement and operation hours for businesses. Above all, if we wish to travel the world freely sometime this year, keeping track of the measures put in place for our safety should be done in order to stop the spread of the COVID-19 virus in our country.

There is no crystal ball to tell us which strategy from which country will work best for this year, but one common message is being received by citizens in every nation worldwide: stay home when possible, wear a mask, and wash your hands often.





HOW SHOULD I HOST MY FAMILY OR ATTEND A GATHERING?



- Make sure to check the COVID-19 infection rates where you and your guests are living
- Limit the number of attendees at your event or give shifts for different families to visit
- Give your guests the option of outdoor seating or if you're attending a family's event, go outside as much as you can
- Avoid hosting your gatherings in crowded and poorly ventilated spaces. For those of us in apartments, this may be a good time to book the pool area or gardens in your complex!
- If you're hosting your event outdoors under an open-air tent, make sure that seating is spaced 1 metre apart; make sure as a guest to stick to your seat
- Always wear a mask when not eating or drinking and require your guests to do the same
- While the holidays are a time of joy, avoid shouting or singing, especially indoors


- Encourage your family and friends to wash their hands with prepared soap and water, and/or provide them with plenty of hand sanitiser that has is at least 60% alcohol

REVIEW

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OUTLOOK

2020 has been a highly volatile year. We started the year with optimism as the global trade war between US and China was thawing. Global markets were hitting new highs in February.

Then came the COVID-19 pandemic which caused markets to sell-off by 34% (as measured by the MSCI World Index) within a short span of 6 weeks.

However as quickly as the market sold down, the recovery was also swift and rapid. In early April, we saw benchmark gauges retracing back their losses induced by the COVID-19 pandemic as stimulus optimism buoyed market gains. Policymakers were seen doing whatever it takes to shelter the economy through a swathe of stimulus measures ranging from relief packages, loan facilities and asset purchases.

All the losses were finally recovered at the beginning of November which coincided with the initial release of Phase III clinical trial data for the vaccines. So, there is light at the end of the tunnel in every cycle.

However, there is emerging bullish consensus that 2021 will be a recovery year. Current estimates suggest that global GDP is expected to fall by around 5% in 2020. However, this is expected to rebound by 5.4% in 2021 as growth returns and more economies open up.

So far, economic growth has surprised on the upside and there are positive revisions to corporate earnings. These will be supportive of risk assets. Effective vaccines will be key in providing a boost for markets. However, because it will take time to produce, the recovery will be prolonged into 2022 and 2023. Hence, this would be a multi-year recovery theme.

With 2021 being a recovery year, the key investment themes would be normalisation/recovery plays including banks, insurers, materials, consumer discretionary and tourism/hospitality. Stocks that were trading at low multiples are now coming back in flavour as we see a rotation to value.

On the flipside, we are monitoring a few key risks. Firstly, we would be closely monitoring president-elect Joe Biden's approach to dealing with China. Asian markets and Asian foreign exchanges have reacted positively to the recent election results. An antagonistic approach would certainly bring downside risks. Secondly, whether corporate earnings can recover as strongly as expected given the rising COVID-19 cases globally. Market valuations are high and will require good earnings to anchor them. Thirdly, as it will take time to produce enough vaccines for the entire world population, the economic conditions in the near-term could stay muted. Growth may stay tepid until various countries/sectors can fully reboot.

SHOULD YOU ORDER EVERYTHING ONLINE? WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS?

During 2020, we learned that ordering online for most household items, luxury items, and even furniture was a readily available option for most of us. While stores remained shut or were operating at limited capacity, most Malaysians relied on our delivery services to send us the items we need to live our daily lives. Which mode suited us best and what lessons should we carry with us into 2021? Here's a review of where to shop for which product if you're a fan of online shopping.





ONLINE GROCERY SHOPPING – A BIG BOOM OR A BIG FLOP?

When the first lockdown occurred in March 2020, there was a flurry of customers panic-buying from grocery stores before they were shut down or restricted to opening a few hours a day. By the end of each day, grocery stores had empty shelves, especially for essential items, such as toilet paper, cooking oil, rice, and base ingredients such as sugar and salt. In response our government assured us that there was plenty to go around, and while this slightly stemmed the influx of Malaysians haphazardly buying home goods, it was not until the RMCO was in place during July that purchases slowed down to normal levels.

Online, it was the same story: many of the grocery delivery players in our market quickly ran out of riders to accommodate the many orders they were receiving, resulting in some households being informed that their groceries would be delivered three weeks to a month after they had made the order. The risks associated with ordering your household products online is therefore the time it takes for it to be delivered, as well as whether the items you chose will be sent to you. For the new year, these services should be considered as they are very convenient, but make sure you have someone at home to collect, or you may face longer waiting times for your goods.

SHOPPING FOR THE SAKE OF SHOPPING ON E-COMMERCE PLATFORMS •

There are two well-known e-commerce platforms in Malaysia and while both can be considered competitors, most customers find that if one website doesn't have the item they're looking for, the other will. In addition to the convenience of not having to visit a mall to pick up the item you're looking for, both websites have competitive pricing for items you may not be able to get in store and some products that are not available on shelves, such as makeup or technology goods that come from the US and Europe.

However, after a year of ordering online, there are risks to consider. Firstly, there is the question of authenticity of these items you are clicking on, especially for big releases such as the latest consoles or tablets. Many of the listings on these apps proclaim they are original, but it is always prudent to read reviews and check pricing via price comparison websites. It is important for customers to realize that some sellers online are unscrupulous and out to make quick money by listing items that are inauthentic and sometimes procured illegally. The best advice for shopping these items online? Always buy from the official store, and be patient: good things come to those who wait. The second risk of buying online is of course the delivery time. Just as it was in the period when groceries were in demand, many delivery companies have been overwhelmed by the sheer volume of orders that have happened during 2020, which resulted in delayed or even lost items becoming a common complaint amongst Malaysians. By scouring popular online forums and social media, it's clear that a buyer must be aware that items cannot be delivered right to their doorstep the next day, as these delivery players need the time to sort out routes and ensure that all products are sent to the right person on the right date. For those of us who have ordered items from overseas, the wait has proven several times to be even longer than expected; purchases from western countries such as the US and the UK were sometimes delayed by a month, due to changing flight routes and travel restrictions.

FURNITURE: TO BUY ONLINE OR TO CHECK IT OUT IN STORE?

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Malaysians have always considered furniture shopping as a family past time, flocking to a certain Swedish giant's stores in the Klang Valley, Penang and Johor. When the pandemic struck however, those stores were forced to shut down for a period time, and measures to prevent COVID-19 had to be hurriedly put in place in order to accommodate their customers once they were allowed to open their doors again. In order to mitigate this drop in visitors (and obviously, eventual buyers), this company got approval from government authorities in late April to resume delivery services, although at-home assembly services were still on hold. The catch? There will be delivery fees imposed to get your furniture home.

And what about other options for ordering furniture online? Both aforementioned online platforms have furniture items available for sale, but with these items, many have found the quality to be subpar, and the furniture even arrives damaged at times, resulting in returns and refunds. Delivery times have also varied, with some customers receiving items the very next day, while others have had to wait weeks for their new table or chairs. These e-commerce platforms also have the option to buy furniture from China, with the proviso that delivery times may be delayed, again due to changing flight routes and travel restrictions. When planning to redecorate your home or get some much-needed furniture for work-from-home purposes, it is

therefore best to expect your items to arrive later and to prepare for the possibility of missing screws or damaged wood. With this in buying your mind, furniture in store, where you can see it fully assembled and are able take it home immediately, would probably still be the best bet for your household.





In Conclusion: Shopping Online Warrants Shopping Responsibly

As tempting as online discounts and free shipping offers may be, a customer should always check the reviews and feedback pages of a shop in order to make sure they're legitimate businesses that offer good customer service and are willing to accept returns or refunds when needed. While it is indeed virtually possible to fulfill all your daily needs by ordering online (which in turn keeps you safe from the pandemic), it is also prudent to decide to buy offline when you need the products soon.
