

Oh, To The Kampung You Should Go!

The experience of balik kampung is one that all Malaysians share during different times of the year. Nothing beats the feeling of packing a bag, getting in the car or on a flight and traveling across the country to reunite with old friends and your family members. However, there's also many people in the Klang Valley that don't have a kampung to go home to, so what should they do instead? We'd recommend a jaunt to one of these unique new villages on the list that will be sure to satisfy your longing to experience the joy of returning to the simple life.

New Villages specifically are known as kampung baru in Malay; they are settlements that were established during the Malayan Emergency between 1948 and 1950. People living in surrounding areas were relocated to them by the government of the day to control their communication with the guerrilla army and cut off their supply. At present, Malaysia has 452 traditional New Villages, and they're all great places to visit if you are craving a rural retreat.



JOHOR

Bekok, Labis

Soak in the charm of a small community at Bekok, which is nestled near the entrance to a national park, making it also the perfect spot for nature lovers. Bekok also has an interesting art scene and ancient landmarks that are not to be missed. Key highlights of this kampung include the Bekok waterfalls, Bekok festival, street murals, and the nearby Hakka Cultural Centre.

SELANGOR

Pulau Ketam, Port Klang

Klangites will have heard of Pulau Ketam which is just a short ferry ride from Port Klang. Built entirely on an island, the village has picturesque houses on stilts and a bevy of seafood dining options, as well as historical monuments and a bustling market. It's a peaceful place, with no traffic and natural mangroves surrounding the settlement. Ready to try some crab that the island is famous for? Check out Pin Heong Seafood Restaurant.





KEDAH

Kampung Bagan Samak, Bandar Baru

Kampung Bagan Samak sits at the border between Kedah and Penang, and is best known for its seafood, but has other attractions and unique activities to witness, including the breeding of arowana, an extremely valuable freshwater fish.

For the purposes of this review, we stayed at Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur during the Ramadhan period and still found plenty to do and see on Jalan Kamunting; the rooms at Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur were very comfortable and modern, while also incorporating a touch of old-world charm through pictures in the rooms of Kuala Lumpur in decades past.



ACCOMMODATION: A ROOM FOR EVERYONE

Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur has 184 bespoke guest rooms and suites, with interiors that infuse a unique blend of contemporary design and urban chic and reflects the character and history of the neighbourhood. Each room comes with custom furnishings, free Wi-Fi, HD TV, and an espresso coffee machine, as well as all the overnight essentials you may require during your stay.

There are four types of rooms available to guests:

Deluxe

Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur's Deluxe rooms have a modern flair and refreshing design; each room is fitted with state-of-the-art tech for your convenience. The neighbourhood's heritage is on full display with black and white photography of 1940s-50s Jalan Kamunting adorning the walls.

Executive Deluxe

These rooms have custom fixtures and furnishings which come in a neutral palette, thus relaxing the mind and providing a sense of calm in the midst of the city's hustle and bustle. Offering a bit more space than the Deluxe rooms, a stay in the Executive Deluxe room is perfect for both business travellers and pleasure seekers.

DINING: RUSTIC CHARM AND RELAXING VIBES

Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur's in-house restaurant is Brasserie 25, which features an interior or red-brick arcade, mid-century copper sputnik chandeliers and dark wood floors. Guests can enjoy breakfast, lunch and dinner here and are spoilt for choice from an ever-changing seasonal menu and unique dishes prepared by Guest Chefs.

Ever conscious of the current COVID-19 restrictions, Brasserie 25 allows guests to choose from a selection of Asian and Western cuisine for sahur and breakfast, while also providing them with plastic gloves and mask holders for the duration of their meal. A dish of particular note is the restaurant nasi lemak, served with the usual fixings of anchovies, peanuts, cucumber and delicious homemade sambal.

For post-Raya visits to Brasserie 25, we'd recommend spending a weekend afternoon indulging in salads, bruschetta, artisanal sandwiches and a main course from the restaurant for RM60++ per person. Their brunch menu is available every Saturday and Sunday from 11.30 am to 2.30 pm.

If you're more of a night owl, try the restaurant's barbeque menu; it features items such as Beef Brisket, Chicken with Sumac spices, and Farmer's Sausages, as well as roasted vegetables, steak fries, and a variety of dips. For dessert, make sure to order their freshly made waffles that come with an assortment of toppings. Brasserie 25 offers their barbeque menu every Friday and Saturday from 6 pm to 10 pm, with prices starting from RM120++ for two people.

HOTEL STRIPES KUALA LUMPUR: A DOORWAY INTO THE KUALA LUMPUR OF YEARS PAST AND THE YEARS AHEAD

Stepping outside the hotel leads guests right into the heart of old KL. This part of town features The Row, which was once known as The Asian Heritage Row, was previously a hub for KL's nightlife and party scene in the early 2000's. Today, the twenty-two 1940s shophouses on Jalan Doraisamy have been converted into an enclave of innovative and independent offices, cafes, bars, shops, and an event space.

A visit to Yut Kee, one of KL's busiest coffee shops since 1928, is highly recommended if you're seeking Hainanese-Western dishes and local coffee. The neighbourhood also has a thriving art community with plenty of independent art galleries and pop-up multifunctional art spaces dotting the streets around Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur.

Overall, it was a pleasant if short stay for us at Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur, and we'd love to go back again! If your weekend plans include spending a couple of days exploring this historical part of town and enjoying the sights and sounds, look no further than Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur for a pleasurable and comfortable weekend staycation.

– A torched salmon roll with spiced salmon, ikura, cucumber, avocado, and scallion.

Golden FDI



BRICKFIELDS -

WEI-LING GALLERY

Not your average studio, this gallery is situated in a pre-war shophouse that was previously architect Jimmy Lim's office; sadly, the office burnt down in a fire in 2004, and Jimmy subsequently turned the space into an art gallery for his daughter Wei-Ling, who previously ran Townhouse Gallery in Bangsar.

Entering through the rusty iron-cast railing entrance brings you into an antique warehouse on the ground floor and a large three-floor gallery upstairs with wooden flooring that still has fragments of charred beams preserved in Perspex glass.

In terms of the art you'll find, one of the gallery's most prominent artists is:

Ivan Lam

Born in 1975, Ivan has spent the last 23 years showcasing his mastery of printmaking and contemporary painting; his trademark use of resin shows off his technical ingenuity and transforms the pieces' narratives, adding hyper-reality to the natural, distance to the familiar, and pragmatism to pathos. Recently, Ivan's work has been raising questions around authorship, the role of the artist, and the very nature of art itself.

A+ WORKS OF ART

A+ is another gallery that focuses on contemporary Malaysian and Southeast Asian art. Founded by Joshua Lim in 2017, it offers visitors a look at a variety of practices, including, painting, performance, drawing, sculpture, new media art, photography, video, and installation. Luke Heng







Creating Handicrafts from the Heart

While Malaysia is developing at a rapid rate and Malaysians are looking towards to the future, it is important to remember our past and keep the traditions, cultures, and handicrafts we collectively share alive. This Syawal, Affin takes a quick look at three unique Malaysian handicrafts.

Mengkuang (Terengganu)

A huge pandan-like plant, Mengkuang (Pandanus odoratissimus) grows in the back mangroves and can also be found in the jungle. Locals eat the fruit and use the leaves for weaving. This activity used to be a leisurely pastime of coastal village women in the east coast states during the rainy months, and today, it is a thriving cottage industry. The leaves are collected, boiled, dyed, and made into colourful gift boxes, mats, beach bags, hats, fans, purses, and slippers. Most designs are inspired by Malaysian flora and fauna.

Pua Kumbu (Sarawak)

This craft is the native woven cloth of the Iban, and it is used to create colourful wall-hangings, table cloths, clothes, and furnishings. In the past, it was made using hand-spun cotton and weavers would use dyes made from roots, bark leaves, and other vegetation. The dyeing process itself takes months and done repeatedly to ensure the right shade is reached. The traditional designs of the pua kumbu come from the Iban environment and universe, with the most famous inspiration being the "Ancient Tree of Life" a spiritual vision of the world that is filled with creatures of the rainforest. The art of creating pua kumbu is a symbol of status in Iban society, and a young girl's matrimonial worth and value increases considerably if she is skilled at weaving.

Visitors who'd like to see the weaving in action today must first fly from Kuching to Sibu, take a three-hour boat ride to Kapit, a two-hour trip upriver to Nanga Kain, and another two-hour long boat journey to reach Sungai Kain.

Woodcarving (Kelantan and Terengganu)

In traditional Malay houses, relief wood carvings are usually found on doors, the walls, and windows. It is an ancient craft, passed down from usually father to son and requires patience, skill, and determination. The craft is divided into two categories, ukiran halus which involves carving relief patterns on the hilts of keris, headboards, and cupboards, and ukiran kasar, which is carving that is done on furniture, pillars, windows, rooms, and the eaves of roofs. The designs usually created by woodcarvers are governed by the basic design of awan larat and other common inspirational elements include Quranic verses and plants such as bean tendrils, growing leaves, and leaves of the water lettuce.



A Safe and Joyous Celebration

2022 is shaping up to be the year we finally get to celebrate Raya with our usual festivities and family gatherings, but should we remain cautious about COVID-19? A recent update in the news from a public health expert has in fact warned that daily COVID-19 cases may increase to 20,000 after Aidilfitri, especially since many of us have not received the booster shot and there has been a slow uptake of vaccines among children. It's therefore a good idea to make sure you welcome this joyous occasion by taking certain precautions.



Open Houses - To Go or Not to Go?

Open houses are not banned this year, and it's the best way to soak up the cheerful atmosphere that the Raya season always creates. While you're enjoying the myriad traditional dishes and munching on Raya cookies, do remember that it may be best to keep gatherings limited to a certain number of people, and try to do a COVID-19 RTK test before heading out.

For the kids, receiving a small token of money during Raya is undeniably one of the parts they look forward to the most, but how do we hand out the money safely during endemic times? One way to do it is to take advantage of the eDuit Raya services that many banks (including Affin!) are offering during this period. You can also opt to do a regular online transfer for closer relatives for a safe and contactless way of making their day.

While most of us have decided to gather with as many of our loved ones as possible this Aidilfitri, life and other situations may result in some people not being around during Raya; additionally, family members who are at high risk of COVID complications should be taken into consideration as well.
