April 4

The IPCC concludes its Sixth Assessment Report on climate change. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) warns that greenhouse gas emissions must peak by 2025 at the latest and decline by 43% by 2030, if we want to limit global warming to 1.5°C. FEATURE -THE WRAP UP



May 9

Sri Lankan Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa resigns. The resignation comes hours after his supporters clashed violently with government opponents in Colombo, a conflict that left dozens injured and prompted police to impose a nationwide curfew. He is succeeded by Ranil Wickremesinghe as Prime Minister three days later.



September 8

Queen Elizabeth II passes. The Queen passed away at Balmoral Castle in Scotland at 96 years old and is succeeded by her son, Charles III.





NATO holds a summit in Madrid, Spain. Along with countries from the European Union and the Indo-Pacific, the organisation searched for a consensual defensive reinforcement after the Russian invasion of Ukraine and Russia's sustained threating over the territorial integrity of other nations.



October 28

Elon Musk of Tesla fame acquires Twitter. The acquisition costed US\$44 billion and sent the social media company into a tizzy with a slew of retrenchment exercises and the implementation of new and somewhat bizarre policies.



July 23 Monkeypox becomes a global health

Malaysians take to the polls. The

The World Health Organization declares the recent monkeypox outbreak a Public Health Emergency of International Concern as the number of cases hits 17,000 in 75 countries. day's voting results in a hung parliament, the first in our history, before YBhg. August 28

Floods hit Pakistan. The country declares a climate catastrophe and appeals for international assistance as the death toll exceeds 1,000. The UN and several other nations pledged millions in funding for aid.

December 7 China opens. After a slew of protests against the country's

protests against the country's Zero-COVID policies, the government eases its COVID restrictions. People will no longer need to show negative virus tesets or health codes to travel between different parts of the country, and unless an area is designated as high-risk, work and local production cannot be stopped.

At 43, the mother of two has stuck to her guns and ridden the political wave to join our new government. To date, Hannah has already laid out her 5 key focus points for the Ministry of Youth and Sports:



Prof. Cheah Phaik Yeong, Founder and Head of Bioethics and Engagement, Mahidol Oxford Tropical Medicine Research Unit



Alena Murang, Singer and Songwriter

Alena is a Dayak-European who is known for her eclectic sound, and she highlights her East Malaysian roots in every song. She is one of the first women to play the sape' a traditional lute instrument from Borneo that was originally reserved for male healers. In 2021, her music video for Warrior Spirit, which was directed by Sarah Lois Dorai, won the "Best Music Video" category at the Rome International Movie Awards, a "Special Jury Award" at the Los Angeles Film Awards, and "Best Ethnographic Film" and "Best Music Video" at the New York International Awards. At present, the Sarawakian is continuing to promote her 2021 Album "Sky Songs" having just finished a concert tour in October, and has also done collaboration videos with The Connected Mangroves Project by Ericsson and Smart Connection, as well as MARECET, an NGO focused on marine mammal research and conservation in Southeast Asia.

- 1) Making sports accessible to all Malaysians;
- 2) Ensuring that athletes have safe spaces to practice their sport;
- 3) To look after athletes' welfare and to engage with them for their feedback;
- 4) To review existing programmes under the Ministry and to empower these programmes; and
- 5) To work on restoration and rehabilitation for the youth, and raise awareness that they can develop themselves in other ways aside from excelling in academia.

(MORU)

Penang-born Professor Cheah Phaik Yeong is a professor of global health at the University of Oxford; their work revolves around research related to the health of populations around the world. At (MORU) in Bangkok, Phaik has spearheaded many engagement activities in Southeast Asia, and is in charge of ensuring that MORU's research is ethical, responsive, and that its potential health impact is maximised. In 2019, Phaik won the University of Oxford Vice Chancellor's Choice Award for Public Engagement for her "Village Drama Against Malaria" project. At present, she is conducting research on antimicrobial resistance, highlighting the significant implications of antibiotics becoming ineffective against infections, which is a major global health challenge that will affect generations to come.


LUCK BROS KOPI **A KOTA DAMANSARA**





The combination of extravagance and the integration of the most cutting-edge technology makes this opulent vehicle a true force to be reckoned with, well worthy of the hype it has generated since its announcement.

STEPPING INTO A NEW ERA WITH A CLASSIC NAMEPLATE

Back in April, BMW celebrated the 45th birthday of their famed flagship 7 Series sedan by debuting a brand-new generation (model code G70). Poignantly commemorating this momentous anniversary, was the reveal that this iteration would for the first time be available in both traditional

the longest and largest vehicles on our roads, the 544 hp and 745 n M propels the sedan from 0-100 km/h in just 4.7 seconds! The i7 will also boast one of the highest total ranges for EVs at up to 615 km. Charging times vary depending on the power but at high power stations, the i7 can be charged from 10% to 80% in just 50 minutes.



combustion engine and battery electric variants. The latter variant, for which this article is about, has been given the "i" moniker treatment and was named the i7. The latest addition joins the family with some of its i branded siblings being the i3 (established almost a decade ago in 2013) and the exceedingly popular large iX SUV (established just last year in 2021).

REVEALING A NEW POTENTIAL IN ELECTRIC POWER

Ranking far behind comfort and prestige, performance had generally never really been an important priority on the checklist for ultra-luxury car shoppers. What vehicles like the i7 do is make it so that there doesn't need to be a compromise. While it's still largely meant to be a chauffeur driven car, we're willing to bet that prospective owners will want to regularly take their i7 for a spin. What has been achieved with the technology is nothing short of spectacular and this shows in the performance figures. The i7 is powered by two electric motors. Despite its future status as one of

BEAUTIFUL SOPHISTICATION; INSIDE AND OUT

Mandatory kidney grilles aside, the current edition is unrecognisable from the original 1977 7 Series, seemingly sharing very little DNA. However, when we compare it to the more recent offerings from this century, the newest model is unmistakably a 7 Series. This is especially true when viewing from the sides and rear. The profile has not been significantly altered as it retains a similar, solid shape while the distinguishing features of the rear are also recognisable. Up at the front is where we get the most changes with the split headlights bejewelled with Swarovski crystals being the difference. The layout exudes an elegant yet aggressive image. At the centrepiece of it all is the enormous and illuminated kidney grille alluded to earlier. Despite mixed reactions to this style choice, BMW has proceeded to continue enlarging this much talked about feature across several models over the years. Distinguishing itself from ICE variants, the i7 sports noticeable light blue accents along parts of the exterior just like other i branded products.

Entering the palatial interior is pure bliss as passengers are welcomed into a cabin from the future. We would ordinarily start by describing the cockpit but an exception must be made for a rear passenger compartment that is truly one of a kind. Nestled inconspicuously above the lush furnishings, the star of the show is the drop-down 31 inch display that turns the cabin into a mini cinema. Lounging in the ergonomic seats will make it difficult to go back to the average massage chair. The reclinable seating will remind distinguished occupants of luxury air travel as they immerse themselves in their chosen media. Expect to relax on the smoothest leather hides known to mankind.

Moving up front, another enormous screen spans from behind the steering wheel to the centre console and immediately grasps attention. This one is curved and houses the latest BMW iDrive infotainment system. As is reasonable to expect moving through the 20's, wireless android and apple connectivity is standard for those who prefer a mobile interface. The wide screen is where we can see the most family resemblance with the iX. Air vents are cleverly hidden underneath the swooping screen so passengers might be too mesmerised to notice that they are seemingly absent. Swarovski's Advanced Crystals make a reappearance on the inside as they are the material of many key touch points such as the seat adjusters and the dash. BMW assures that the Advanced Crystals are developed with planet-consciousness at the forefront of their production process.

The introduction of augmented reality in navigation has made journeying through tricky routes much easier. The i7 may not be the first vehicle to feature augmented arrows on the road but the ability to see these waypoints right behind the steering wheel is a very convenient and safe feature. Another feature is the ability to store difficult manoeuvres in the car's memory. This will be extremely useful to avoid that pesky three-point turn after a long day out. Once the car has committed the routine to memory, the driver can just relax as it self-parks. For the last generation 7 Series, there was much buzz surrounding the feature of controlling the car from the key fob. While many would still find this tech mindblowing, BMW has taken it a step further by allowing the control of the vehicle from registered smartphones. The main use for this would be for tight parking spots but people have been creative in its use. The whole experience is sort of like piloting the largest remote control car ever - a childhood dream realised. The aforementioned 31 inch screen in the rear compartment boasts an 8k resolution and claims the record for being the largest screen available in any car. The user experience feels much like a smart TV with options such as YouTube and Netflix. Paired with the phenomenal Bowers & Wilkins speaker system, BMW promises an ultra-immersive in-vehicle cinema.



Those considering an i7 will need to hold out a little longer for further information on the Malaysian release. Pricing estimates start from around RM 700k. For more info on the official Malaysian debut, stay tuned.

Continuous developments in EV tech keep us in awe. The BMW i7 with its elec-terrific innovations is a perfect example of this in action. Having said that, the cartists in Munich have outdone themselves beyond the wonders of EV tech, succeeding in bringing our collective awe to new levels. To label the i7 as "high-tech" feels like a vast understatement – the description simply doesn't do it justice. Among the smorgasbord of features included are; an advanced augmented reality system, the ability to pre-set tricky manoeuvres, the ability to remote control the vehicle using smartphones, and an unprecedented cinematic experience like no other.

The Economy | Malaysia to Weather the Storm?

For months on end, financial experts and institutional bodies alike have been warning of a global recession that will impact every country, but in a recent article, RAM Ratings has reported that it expects Malaysia's broad and diversified base to cushion intensified headwinds to growth in 2023. Our GDP growth will slow to 4% - 5% next year, down from 8.2% in 2022, but domestic demand is expected to drive the economy as our businesses and households continue to recover from the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Thus, despite the global economic slowdown, which will likely dampen our exports, and notable price pressures as well as tighter monetary concerns, Malaysia is expected to remain resilient and ready in the year ahead.
